

Thank you for your continued investment in our 150 students and their families. These last two years have been an amazing journey for the board and we have seen how Homework House is greater than any of us. During the two years, the board created an executive manage-



ment team to manage and oversee Homework House. The close up provided board members the opportunity to be more hands on and also helped us realize this was not the ideal model for continued growth. Meet Shana!

I began with just wanting to get more involved with a local ministry. After two years tutoring, my heart literally felt imbedded in the neighborhood, the City of Azusa, and the kids. My educational background was a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science from Azusa Pacific University, but I was

continually being called to working with these kids who deserved a fair shot at higher education. I came on as Program



Director for the Parent Resource Center and Kinder-5th grade program in 2007.

I knew there would be challenges and a learning curve but I didn t expect the overwhelming support from the families. Members from the Parent Advisory Group helped me make connections with the community, aided me in my language acquisition, and accompanied me on home visits. Today, the parent program is one of the most vital elements and I m excited everyday as to what we can accomplish with so many hands.

Every day is a struggle to provide answers to so many issues: health care deficiencies, immigration policies, fair housing issues, the education system for English Language Learners, gang violence, and the lack of role models in low-income neighborhoods. Our volunteers enter with such a heart for this community that I am rejuvenated every time I see them tackling these issues with bravery. I would not choose to be molded and grow in any other environment than by the staff, leaders, volunteers, and students that I am surrounded by daily here at Our Neighborhood Homework House.
